Optometry Charges

From 1 January 2015, when you obtain new glasses, optometrists can now set their own fees for their services, some of which can usually be reimbursed by Medicare. The fee which pensioners are charged varies, but may leave a gap of perhaps \$10.



However, some optometrists still bulk bill in which case no fee is charged.

The most convenient way to claim the Medicare benefit is at your optometrist if they offer electronic claiming (you need an EFTPOS card, and the Medicare benefit is credited to your account within 1 or 2 days), otherwise you can claim online or visit a Medicare Centre.

If you have held a pension card, health care card or Seniors Card for over 6 months, you are still entitled to free spectacles every 2 years under the Spectacle Supply Scheme (SSS), or earlier if you have certain changes in your eyesight. However, the optometrist may charge their fee for examination and prescription.

Entry into an Aged Care Home

The booklet, "Five steps to entry into an aged care home", published by the Australian Government, aims to help older people, families and carers understand the process for moving into an aged care home.

It outlines five steps to follow: determining eligibility, finding an aged care home, costs, applying for an aged care home, and what it's like to live there (including resident agreement, rights & responsibilities, and more). It also includes a help list of questions with relevant phone numbers.

Commemorative ANZAC Records



Almost 10,000 hand-written records of Queenslanders killed in World War 1 have been digitised and are now accessible online through the Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages.

The digitised records can be searched online for free. Images of

individual registry entries and commemorative death certificates are available for a fee: the commemorative ANZAC death certificate (with a picture of either poppies or a soldier) to commemorate the death of a fallen family member, costs \$28.

New rules for Bicycles

Drivers should know about new rules for bicycles that have been introduced in Queensland. Cyclists can now:

- ride on a single lane roundabout like any other road user, taking up the whole lane
- choose **not** to ride in a bicycle lane bicycle lanes are now optional
- ride across zebra and children's crossings, as long as they stop and check that it's safe to do so first.

Also, when passing a cyclist, drivers must give a minimum passing distance of at least 1 metre in a 60km/h zone, or 1.5m in a speed zone of above 60km/h.

It is legal for cyclists to ride on footpaths, though they must give way to pedestrians.
